

International-Mindedness

International-mindedness is central to the IB mission and is a foundational principle to its educational philosophy; it is at the heart of the continuum of international education.

International-mindedness is a view of the world in which people see themselves connected to the global community and assume a sense of responsibility towards its members. It is an awareness of the interrelatedness of all nations and peoples, and is a recognition of the complexity of these. Internationally minded people appreciate and value the diversity of peoples, cultures and societies in the world. They make efforts to learn more about others and to develop empathy and solidarity towards them to achieve mutual understanding and



respect (Oxfam 2105; UNESCO 2015).

Primary Years Programme (PYP) learners and their learning communities have a range of perspectives, values and traditions. The concept of internationalmindedness builds on these diverse perspectives to generate a sense of common humanity and shared guardianship of the planet.

In addition, the learner profile and approaches to learning provide the dispositions and foundational skills for the development and demonstration of international-mindedness.

IB PYP Terminology

Concept-Based

The IB emphasizes learning concepts rather than topics and aids the student in learning how they apply across all humanity in various ways. For example, with IB it is not enough to learn about specific events (such as the Oregon Trail or the Trail of Tears), but even more important to explore the concepts of migration or oppression and its implications across history and today. The 7 Key Concepts the IB PYP focuses on are listed to the right.

Ways You Could Support Your Child as a PYP Parent

As an essential member of your child's learning community, you play an important role helping them take their learning deeper. There are 5 simple ways you can support your child's learning at home. Whether it is the more formal learning connected to their schooling, or the incidental, unplanned learning through play, exploration, and life experience; these 5 strategies will help you, help your child become a lifelong learner. November's issue focused on "taking an inquiry stance" and December focused on "supporting conceptual understanding". Here is strategy three for the month of January:

Prioritize Reflection

- a. Get Them Thinking About Their Thinking
 - i. How do you know?
 - ii. What makes you think that?
 - iii. Is there another way that you could do that?
 - iv. What did you find easy or challenging? Why?

To nurture your student's ability to reflect in a healthy way, these questions work for everything and every time.

Ways Parents Can Help Students to be Open-Minded at Home

- Model open and accepting behavior for all humans.
- Encourage students to try new things new foods, new games and new activities.
- Expose students to different festivals, celebrations and traditions and be sure to present them in a non-judgmental way.
- Encourage students to really listen to others when they speak.
- Introduce literature about many different cultures into your home library. Be sure that it is appropriate and reflects the culture in an appropriate way.
- Introduce students to other countries, cultures, and global issues.
- Listen to a variety of types of music.
- Ask questions to discover more information.
- Have them reflect on their own learning and the ideas of others.
